We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2017-18 educational progress for Waverly Community Schools. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and some requirements of state laws. Our staff is available to help you understand this information. These reports contain the following information:

Student Assessment Data – Includes the following three assessments: M-STEP (Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress), MI-Access (Alternate Assessment), and College Board SAT. Presents assessment information for English language arts and mathematics for grades 3 to 8 and 11, and MI-Access science for grades 4, 7, and 11, compared to state averages for all students as well as subgroups of students. The report helps users to understand achievement performance within grades and schools, and to make comparisons to district, state, and national achievement benchmarks.

Accountability – Detail Data and Status

The accountability portion of the AER includes assessment proficiency and participation rates, graduation or attendance rates, as well as accountability index values showing school performance on a 0-100 scale.

Teacher Qualification Data

- Identifies the number and percentage of inexperienced teachers, principals, and other school leaders Reports teachers who are teaching with emergency or provisional credentials
- Includes teachers who are not teaching in the subject or field for which they are certified

NAEP Data (National Assessment of Educational Progress)

- Provides state results of the national assessment in mathematics and reading every other year in grades 4 and 8

Civil Rights Data

- Provides information on school quality, climate and safety

Review the table below listing our schools. For the 2017-18 school year, schools were identified using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has three or more underperforming student subgroups. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67%. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no status label is given.

* Note TSI and ATS definitions were changed for the 2018-19 school year per federal requirements. The new definitions are:

TSI – The school has at least one subgroup performing in the bottom 25% within each applicable accountability index component.

ATS – The school has met the criteria for TSI identification and has at least one subgroup performing at the same level as a CSI school.

School Name	Status Label	Key Initiative to Accelerate Achievement
Colt Early Childhood Education Center	No Label	Full-time reading teacher and four instructional paraprofessionals to support literacy instruction. Professional Learning Communities meet during delayed starts to discuss instructional strategies.
Elmwood Elementary School	No Label	Intervention model has certified teachers as interventionists, an instructional coach, and instructional paraprofessionals who provide additional support to students in reading. Data is used to determine appropriate and targeted interventions for each student.
Winans Elementary School	No Label	Intervention model has certified teachers as interventionists, an instructional coach, and instructional paraprofessionals who provide additional support to students in reading. Data is used to determine appropriate and targeted interventions for each student.
East Intermediate School	No Label	All students benefit from a purposeful, data-driven intervention program for math and reading, designed to meet the needs of our diverse learners. Students receive additional support as well as enrichment during intervention periods. All 5 th grade students take a math elective in addition to their core math class.
Waverly Middle School	TSI	Universal intervention class periods in which all students receive targeted instruction in reading and math.
Waverly High School	No Label	Initiatives that provide additional academic support for students are offered during the PRIDE Period. This is a class period in which all students have access to all teachers for additional support and are able to have an adult monitoring their progress toward their educational goals. In addition, opportunities to participate in clubs and special presentations are offered during this time.

Waverly Community Schools strive to provide safe learning environments in which our students can achieve to their full potential. Our educators use student data to make instructional plans and provide academic interventions as needed. We appreciate the support from and partnership with our families.
